Accessibility Information

This is your guide to the accessibility levels of Arkansas State Park facilities. All new facilities offer barrier-free access, while a variety of facilities that have attracted visitors over the decades have been retrofitted to offer barrier-free access. Work is in progress to improve accessibility levels throughout the park system. Some facilities, due to the natural terrain in which they're located, are deemed inaccessible or impossible to access even with assis-

tance. This information is intended to guide visitors to those park facilities that will best meet their individual needs. All park visitors are urged to take personal limitations into consideration when using any Arkansas State Park facility. If you have questions about any state park or museum, park staff is available to answer your questions and provide any details you may require. We welcome the opportunity to assist you in finding facilities that will make your visit to an Arkansas state park a most enjoyable experience. You're always welcome to

Visitor Programs

Arkansas State Parks offers over 40,000 interpretive programs and events each year for the education and entertainment of our visitors. Many of these are designed with the needs of visitors with disabilities in mind. Park amphitheaters provide barrier-free access for evening interpretive programs and daily workshops. Guided hikes are often offered on

barrier-free trails, and fishing workshops are conducted on barrier-free fishing piers. Park staff and guest speakers offer a variety of accessible programs in park visitor centers or lodges. Discounts

In accordance with PD 2000.2:

Arkansas citizens 62 and over will be admitted to campgrounds at one-half the regular campsite fee Sunday through Thursday nights and at a 25% discount weekends and holidays. Out-of-state citizens 62 and over will receive a 25% discount Sunday through

Thursday nights and no discount on weekends or holidays. The discount to senior citizens does not apply to winter rates or Rental Camping Facility Options. NOTE: Government issued photo identification with date of birth is required as proof of age. Forms of ID include: Drivers License, U.S. Passport, U.S. Military ID Card, Military dependent or retiree ID Card, United States Permanent Resident Card. U.S. Citizens with 100% total and permanent disability will be admitted

to campgrounds at one-half the regular campsite fee year round. The discount to disabled citizens does not apply to winter rates or Rental Camping Facility Options. Current written proof of 100% total and permanent disability is required. (See P. D. 2000.2)

Special Note

To ensure you enjoy your state park experience, be aware of the natural world. There are some areas that are potentially hazardous to all visitors. Since it is impractical to post signs at all danger points, use caution when approaching such areas as cliffs, caves, heavily wooded areas, swamps, streams and lakes. Adults are responsible for children in their care. If unsure about possible hazards, check at the visitor center.

GUIDE TO ACCESSIBILITY SYMBOLS

- A- ACCESSIBLE: Facility is barrier free or has minor barriers which can usually be overcome with little difficulty.
- R- REASONABLY ACCESSIBLE: Facility has barriers, making access difficult; however, with assistance barriers can usually be overcome.
- I- INACCESSIBLE: Facility has barriers which are difficult or impossible to overcome even with assistance.
